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The OLEANDER - a Time Traveler

This is an excerpt (Part 1) from an article written January 2019 by Irmtraud Gotsis with translation by James Nicholas and located in the Oleander Haus website. (We will continue to add to the story each Newsletter).







"The genus Nerium, whose best-known representative is N. oleander L. existed in Europe as early as the later Cretaceous period, and indeed was found in Central Europe as well as in Southern Europe at that time; it was still present during the Tertiary period also.

Even during the earliest Tertiary period, a plant related to our current oleander existed in Southern France (Meximieux and Valentine), and Ferdinand Pax has recently described a Nerium bielzii from the Tertiary strata of Hermannstadt in Siebenbürgen [Transylvania] (Grundzüge Pflanzenverbr. Karpathen II (1908)23). On the basis of this fact, it is quite impossible that the oleander reached Europe only in historic times; the northern limits of its range were merely shifted southward as a result of the glacial period." (Victor Hehn, Berlin 1870).

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Turner's Shari D



We highlight one of our yellows this month! Turner's Shari D. Barry Landry took the photo and advised that the flower was bred in Corpus Christi. Unfortunately, both Mr. Turners are deceased and no one at their nursery has breeding records.

In the Park, the Shari D is located on the Fire House side.

The Shari D is a dwarf plant with large flowers on tight bouquets.
